1. Public Comment (Items Not on Presented Agenda)

There were none.

2. Main Street Gentry Chamber of Commerce

Janie Parks reported that Santa will be in the Chamber Building on Saturday, Dec. 8 from 3-5 pm. The Christmas Parade will begin at 6:30 pm. The annual Quilt Show will be Jan. 11-18, 2019 in the McKee Room. She also distributed United Way forms and asked all Councilmen to remember this “Season of Giving” by giving to the United Way in 2019. They contribute to many local agencies.

3. Gentry Senior Activity Center

Maxine Foster distributed the monthly calendar and menu. She invited all adults to attend the “Hidden in Plain Sight” exhibit on Dec. 12 from 10-12 am in the McKee Room. The purpose of this program is to teach adults to be able to find places where drugs may be hidden in a room. The Center will also have a Christmas party and the monthly birthday party. The Center also continues to have Exercise Class, Art Lessons, and Crafting Activities. She invited all to call and come eat lunch with them.

4. Gentry Public Schools

Supt. Metz said that the High School would be having music concerts on the next 2 Sundays, Dec.9 and 16. There is also a basketball game on Dec. 14 with a silent auction and Toy Toss.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

1. Dawn Hill East Bridge Update

The Mayor reported that it had been necessary to change the single span of the bridge to a triple span on the 30% drawings to prevent negative impact on neighboring properties. ARDOT had asked for more time to review these revised plans. The location of the Bridge requires it to be designed for Overtopping, which requires a Variance. The Mayor hoped that this approval would be coming soon and that we can proceed to the 60% planning stage.

2. Parks Master Plan Update

The Mayor reported that passage of the additional sales tax will help the progress of the Master Plan. He had talked with Nathan Street from McClelland, and he will be meeting soon with the Committee. No new sales tax from the election will be collected till April 1, 2019 at the soonest. The new Budget reflects this date.

3. Water Storage Facility Update

The Mayor reported that the design of the Water Storage Facility is almost complete. They are waiting on 1 Geotech report. Four of the five boring attempts hit bedrock, but it is necessary to have the 5th to also be on bedrock. It has not yet been reached at a 40' depth, so further investigation is being done. When this is accomplished, then the project can be let out for bids.

4. Sign Ordinance

There was no available time for the Economic Development Committee to meet this month, so this issue is postponed for another month.

5. Feral Cats Discussion Update

The Economic Development Committee was also not available to meet and discuss this issue.

6. 2019 Budget Resolution

The 2019 Budget was included in the Agenda packet. The Mayor reported that all recommended changes had been made and were part of the Budget being presented tonight.

1. Sunset Ridge Phase 2A Final Plat Approval Ordinance w/Emergency

This Ordinance was included in the Agenda Packet. Ron Homeyer was present to answer any questions. There were small copies of the Phase 2A Plat Map attached to the Ordinance. Councilman Furgason had some questions for Mr. Homeyer. 1. He asked if the entire dark area shown as an insert on the Plat Map would be filled with housing. Mr. Homeyer said that was the intent. 2. Councilman Furgason also asked if there would be more than one entry to the housing subdivision. Mr. Homeyer said that later on there would be stub outs for future entry and exiting. 3. Councilman Furgason also asked if utilities were buried and what the income level of these houses would be. Mr. Homeyer said that utilities were buried except to the sewer lift station, and he didn't know the price of these future houses.

2. Land and Improvements Purchase Ordinance w/Emergency

This Ordinance is also included in the Agenda packet. This house and land, currently owned by Richard and Cindy Godin is located adjacent to the Park Master Plan area. The City would use this as a future Maintenance Facility. The Mayor asked permission to enter into this purchase contract with the Godins with the price not to exceed \$150,000 plus up to \$10,000 in closing costs and expenses. This amount is covered in the Budget. He pointed out Section 3, which stated if the appraised value exceeded this amount, then the difference would be recognized as a donation. The appraisal came in today at \$260,000. Councilman Furgason asked if the extra traffic and trucks would disturb residents on this road. The Mayor said there should not be any difference in traffic.

3. Water Dept. Vehicle Purchase Ordinance w/Emergency

This Ordinance was included in the Agenda packet. The Mayor explained that the Water Dept is in need of a 1-ton truck to haul equipment. They currently are using a ¾ ton truck for hauling, which poses a safety issue. This is the reason for the Emergency Clause. The Mayor said this item was included in the 2019 budget but one was found on the lot in Siloam Springs. It can be purchased at the fleet pricing of \$42,599. He said that the City was also trying to purchase a generator, which was included in the 2018 budget. It would be possible to trade these 2 items in the 2 budgets by purchasing the vehicle this year and the generator in 2019.

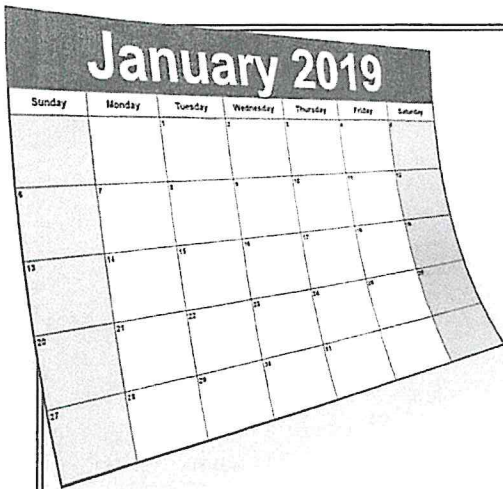

Reminder to All City Councils Regarding First Council Meeting of 2019

The 90th General Assembly of the Arkansas Legislature in 2015, via Act 235, amended A.C.A. § 14-43-501 regarding the organization at the beginning of a new year of the governing bodies of cities and towns.

A.C.A. § 14-43-501. Organization of governing body

- (a)(1) The members of a governing body elected for each city or town shall annually in January assemble and organize the governing body.
- (2)(A) A majority of the whole number of members of a governing body constitutes a quorum for the transaction of business.
- (B)(i) The governing body shall judge the election returns and the qualifications of its own members.
- (ii) These judgments are not subject to veto by the mayor.
- (C)(i) The governing body shall determine the rules of its proceedings and keep a journal of its proceedings, which shall be open to the inspection and examination of any citizen.
- (ii) The governing body may also compel the attendance of absent members in such a manner and under such penalties as it prescribes.
- (iii) The governing body may consider the passage of rules on the following subjects, including without limitation:
- (a) The agenda for meetings;
 - (b) The filing of resolutions and ordinances; and
 - (c) Citizen commentary.
- (b)(1)(A) In the mayor-council form of government, the mayor shall be ex officio president of the city council and shall preside at its meetings.
- (B) The mayor shall have a vote to establish a quorum of the city council at any regular or special meeting of the city council and when his or her vote is needed to pass any ordinance, bylaw, resolution, order, or motion.
- (2) In the absence of the mayor, the city council shall elect a president pro tempore to preside over council meetings.
- (3) If the mayor is unable to perform the duties of office or cannot be located, one (1) of the following individuals may perform all functions of a mayor during the disability or absence of the mayor:
- (A) The city clerk;
 - (B) Another elected official of the city if designated by the mayor; or
 - (C) An unelected employee or resident of the city if designated by the mayor and approved by the city council.
- (c) As used in this section, "governing body" means the city council in a mayor-council form of government, the board of directors in a city manager form of government, and the board of directors in a city administrator form of government.

ORDINANCE NO. _____

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING PORTIONS OF TITLE 14 OF THE CITY OF GENTRY MUNICIPAL CODE ADOPTING THE SPECIFIC PLAN ZONING DISTRICT; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

WHEREAS, it has come to the attention of the City of Gentry that there is a need to amend portions of Section 14. of the City of Gentry Municipal Code regarding Zoning Districts as is hereinafter set forth.

NOW, therefore, be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Gentry, Arkansas:

SECTION 1. SPECIFIC PLAN (SP) ZONING DISTRICT.

- A. GENERAL DESCRIPTION. The Specific Plan (SP) district provides a means by which individualized zoning standards can be created for defined areas in which conventional zoning cannot achieve desired results. The SP district may be applied as either a base zone or an overlay zone depending on the defined area's needs and the scope of any proposed project(s) within the defined area. Any proposed change in use in the SP district constitutes a REZONING and must be accompanied by a Specific Plan, which is a small-area plan document designed with community input. Each Specific Plan has its own non-transferable set of regulations which may combine some or all of the following elements for a defined area into one document: zoning standards, list of acceptable land uses, design guidelines, infrastructure plan, phasing plan, and other elements as appropriate.
- B. PLANNING COMMISSION APPROVAL. Any rezoning of property within the SP District shall be presented to the Planning Commission for consideration. Upon Planning Commission approval, any such change in use shall be effective only upon adoption of an Ordinance approving such rezoning.
- C. SPECIFIC PLAN (SP) USES AND REQUIREMENTS.
 - 1. All legal existing uses or legal uses made of such property from and after January 1, 2016 are allowed within the SP District.
 - 2. In the event of a proposed change in usage within the SP District, the owner of the property in question must consent to the proposed change in usage.
 - 3. The Planning Commission shall be presented with a written USAGE PLAN, that includes the following items:

- a. The legal description of the parcel subject to the proposed change;
- b. A map or aerial photo of the parcel subject to the proposed change and the area immediately surrounding it, showing sufficient topographic data to indicate clearly the character of the terrain; waterways; and the location of existing development;
- c. A map, drawing or plan depicting the proposed new use of the plan, including a sketch of proposed improvements;
- d. A detailed description of the proposed new usage, including the following information:
 - i. Minimum lot area (in square feet);
 - ii. Minimum lot width at building line (in feet);
 - iii. Maximum lot coverage (percent);
 - iv. Setbacks from all sides (in feet);
 - v. Height restrictions (in feet);
 - vi. A list of land uses allowed by right or by condition;
 - vii. A map depicting the location and configuration of all infrastructure and public facilities proposed within property. Such facilities include but are not limited to roads, sewers, lift stations, drainage facilities, fire stations, police substations, parks, libraries, communications equipment, and similar facilities;
 - viii. A written and illustrated document, describing in detail any design guidelines for the development, including but not limited to architectural style, materials, colors, themes, streetscapes, public realm elements, and similar issues; and
 - ix. Other elements as appropriate such as grading plans, wildlife mitigation plans, open space management plans, hazardous materials remediation plans, etc.

D. PROCEDURES FOR OBTAINING SP REZONING APPROVAL.

- a. Notice of Hearing for such rezoning application shall be conspicuously posted on the property and published in a newspaper having circulation in Benton County, Arkansas, for a period of not less than 14 days prior to a public hearing which will be held by the Planning Commission for the purpose of considering the proposed rezoning. The initial public hearing should include a presentation in which the proponent of the rezoning provides possible development or redevelopment scenarios. Additional public meetings, workshops, focus group meetings, open house events, and presentations may be scheduled as requested by the Planning Commission. needed by the Planning and Development Department Director or designee. All meetings shall be advertised at least 14 days in advance via prominent signage, letter or email announcements, or any other means deemed

- practical and appropriate by the Planning Commission.
- b. Following such public hearing, the Planning Commission shall investigate or charge City personnel and/or outside contractors or professionals to investigate existing conditions and previous plans in order to determine feasible future development scenarios. Thereafter, but no sooner than the next regular Planning Commission meeting, may the Planning Commission take action on the rezoning request.
 - c. Prior to the meeting at which the Planning Commission will consider taking action on the SP rezoning request, sufficient notice of a public hearing for rezoning shall be furnished in accordance with the Gentry Municipal Code and Arkansas law. The SP rezoning request must clarify whether the rezoning will change the base zone or add an overlay to the existing base zone. The Planning Commission shall take one of four actions: send the rezoning request to the City Council with a positive recommendation; send the rezoning request to the City Council with a negative recommendation; send the rezoning request to the City Council with no recommendation; or hold the rezoning request in committee pending additional information or clarification. The Planning Commission may require additional public meetings or plan revisions prior to issuing a recommendation.
 - d. City Council Consideration. Upon receiving the SP recommendation from the Planning Commission and reviewing the SP rezoning request and Specific Plan document, the City Council shall consider an ordinance rezoning the lands in question. The City Council shall take one of three actions: approve the SP request as recommended by the Planning Commission; approve the SP request with amendment(s); or deny the SP request.

E. PROCEDURES FOR AMENDING A SPECIFIC PLAN PARCEL OR TRACT.

Changes to a parcel or tract rezoned pursuant to a Specific Plan should occur within the framework of the Specific Plan. If, at any time, any individual, organization, business, and/or City department find it necessary or desirable to amend the approved Specific Plan, a plan modification may be requested. Such request shall be made in writing to the Planning Commission, which will determine whether the requested modification meets the criteria of a minor modification or major modification. All modifications must be consistent with the intent of this ordinance.

- a. Minor Modifications. Minor modifications may be granted on vote of the Planning Commission and do not require notice, hearing or Council approval. For a requested modification to be classified as minor, the modification must alter one or more provisions of the Specific Plan and must not: expand the types of land uses specifically allowed in the approved Specific Plan; change the character, function, or number of streets approved in the Specific Plan;

create any foreseeable significant increase in traffic volume or result in any foreseeable negative impacts on traffic flow; or create any significant change to the nature or character of the approved Specific Plan.

b. Major Modifications. Major modifications may be tentatively approved by the Planning Commission, with the further requirement of Council approval by Ordinance. A modification that would result in any of the following will be deemed major: expansion of the types of land uses specifically allowed in the approved Specific Plan; change in the character, function, or number of streets approved in the Specific Plan; foreseeable significant increase in traffic volume or foreseeable negative impacts on traffic flow; or any significant change to the nature or character of the approved Specific Plan. Additionally, the Planning Commission may elect to follow the method for major modification approval for any modification of any lesser magnitude, particularly if such modification is deemed to be in the public interest.

c. Prior to the Planning Commission's review of the SP district modification request, sufficient notice of a public hearing for rezoning shall be furnished in accordance with state law and per the public hearing procedure outlined in the City of Gentry City Code for a change in zoning. After reviewing the major modification request, the Planning Commission may grant the request, which will then be presented to the City Council for final approval. If the Planning Commission denies the major modification request, the applicant may appeal the decision to the City Council by submitting a notice of appeal to the Gentry Director of Finance no more than thirty (30) days from the date of the Planning Commission's decision. The appeal shall be placed on the agenda of the next scheduled meeting of the City Council. The City Council's decision on the appeal issue is final. Minor and major modifications shall be considered unique and shall not set precedent for other SP districts or developments.

d. Changes to the Specific Plan Document. The text and any affected maps, diagrams, and/or images contained within the Specific Plan document shall be amended to reflect any modification(s) to the Specific Plan.

F. SPECIFIC PLAN AVAILABILITY. All Specific Plans approved and adopted by the City Council shall be maintained on file in the City offices and as printed documents and shall be available for public inspection during regular business hours. Individuals, businesses, and/or organizations desiring printed copies of a specific plan may do so for a reasonable administrative fee per printed page.

G. ZONING MAP DESIGNATION FOR SP DISTRICT. All Zoning Map designations for the SP District shall be noted on the official Zoning Map by the designation "SP,". In the event of adoption of Specific Plan zoning for a property or parcel, its location should be shown on the official Zoning Map and the ordinance number assigned to it upon adoption by the City

Council.

Section 4: Emergency. The lands described herein are part of certain comprehensive changes to the City Zoning Code. An emergency exists in that the zoning changes herein should be implemented immediately in order to be consistent with other zoning within the City. This Ordinance, accordingly being necessary for the preservation of the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Gentry, Arkansas, shall be in effect immediately upon its passage, approval and publication.

Section 4: Emergency. The lands described herein are part of certain comprehensive changes to the City Zoning Code. An emergency exists in that the zoning changes herein should be implemented immediately in order to be consistent with other zoning within the City. This Ordinance, accordingly being necessary for the preservation of the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Gentry, Arkansas, shall be in effect immediately upon its

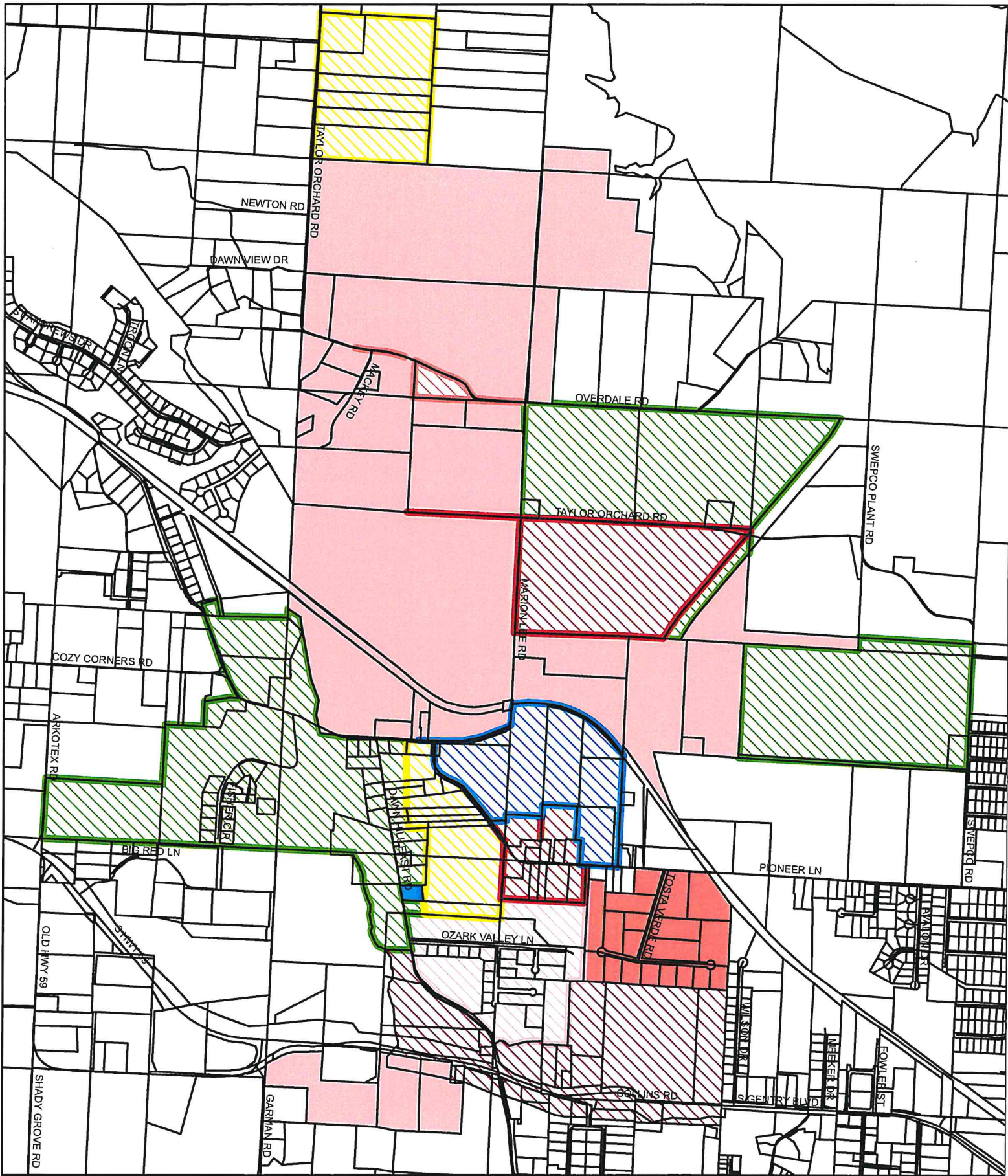

AGREEMENT

THE MAIN STREET GENTRY ASSOCIATION & City of Gentry, Arkansas

WHEREAS, the City of Gentry, Arkansas (CITY), and The Main Street Gentry Association (MSG) are desirous of fostering community growth and prosperity within the City of Gentry; and,

WHEREAS, the City and MSG are desirous of entering into a partnership agreement for the purpose of accomplishing the above stated goal; and,

WHEREAS, the aforementioned parties are desirous that a partnership be formed by and between themselves as a demonstration of their common interest for economic development; and,

WHEREAS, the aforementioned parties are desirous that a partnership agreement be executed as a positive step in building local public-private sector joint-community effort for the growth and prosperity of the CITY.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT AGREED by and between the aforementioned parties that:

1. MSG shall coordinate the CITY'S economic development marketing efforts and public-private sector funding alternatives through MSG, and that MSG further agrees it shall serve as the economic development marketing arm of the CITY.
2. Further, MSG agrees that it shall be assigned the following responsibilities:
 - a. MSG shall coordinate, administer and have overall management of economic development marketing activities and the coordination and administration of the functions above described for the CITY, and more specifically;
 - b. MSG shall be directly responsible for implementation of the following functions:
 - i. Maintenance of a public-private economic development partnership between MSG and the CITY with the end result of advancing the improvement, in the broadest sense, of the quality and the quantity of life in the CITY.

- ii. Implementation of a campaign designed to attract a diverse segment of manufacturing, retail, and service industry to the CITY.
 - iii. Design and execution of an economic development retention and expansion program to encourage local manufacturing, retail, and service industry to remain and expand in the CITY.
 - iv. Operation of an on-going communications and promotions program for economic development activities in the CITY.
 - v. Search for and completion and submission of appropriate Grant applications on behalf of the City from time to time.
 - vi. Such other responsibilities as may be delegated or assigned by the MSG Board of Directors (all of which is the "Agreement").
3. It is further agreed by and between the parties that in the role of serving as the economic development marketing arm for the CITY, MSG shall be responsible for:
 - a. Representing the CITY as the initial contact for manufacturing, retail, and service industry prospects.
 - b. Bringing economic development financial proposals to the CITY for consideration.
 - c. Maintaining economic development files that pertain to manufacturing, retail, and service industry.
4. It is further agreed by and between the parties that the MSG shall provide various other services related to economic development of the City and improvement of the City's relationship with the citizens of the City and the surrounding area. MSG's services shall accordingly include development, sponsorship and organization of community events in coordination with the City, including Freedom Fest and Fall Festival.
5. MSG shall keep City advised of its work by making a monthly written and/or verbal report to the City - which will generally be made at the monthly council meeting.
6. It is further agreed by and between the parties that because of the time involved in the detailed planning by all parties to this agreement for the implementation of this partnership agreement, said agreement shall be in full force and effect for a period of one (1) year beginning January 1, 2019.

7. For the services to be provided by MSG under the terms of this Agreement CITY shall pay to MSG the sum of Thirty Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000) payable in two bi-annual installments in 2019, the first payment to be made on execution of this Agreement.
